Hi, I am Bernard McCree, Assistant Dean of Students for Underrepresented and At-Risk Populations. I have been in this role for over 3 months now and am housed within the Dean of Students suite in Stratton 119. I am not new to KU, having started my 16th year in August and served formerly as the Director of Financial Aid Services. So familiar place, new job, same building, different floor and a new challenge to explore and elevate.

The purpose of this role is to deeply examine all the ways underrepresented and at-risk students are being supported at Kutztown, including systems, programming, and other resources in place and designed to meet the diverse needs of this unique population.

What does underrepresented mean you ask? Historically, it means that certain groups of people were overlooked, disregarded or simply ignored when it came to education, jobs, access to medical treatment, unfair housing practices and even, their ability to vote. In our world, we want to eradicate any barrier that keeps a student from having the opportunities that are afforded them. Opportunities that open closed doors, break glass ceiling and channel negative energies to positive streams of hope for a brighter future.

Our hope is to work with these student populations to determine their challenges and eliminate the barriers that hinder their success here at KU. Being at-risk poses a different threat to our students. Some of the key indicators are housing insecurity, food insecurity, socio-economic barriers, mental health issues, just to name a few.

Our goal is to change how we see, hear and inspire our students, which must be a collective campus effort and to get them to the finish line, ultimately—Graduation!

PASSHE defines Underrepresented Minority (URM) students to include the race/ethnicity of American Indian or Alaska Native, Black or African American, Hispanic and two or more races.
